word of complaint, not one remark wondering "why I have to give up my Sunday." Their thoughts always centered on what was best for our students, families and staff. Their consistent, driving passion provided all the tools needed to safely and effectively accomplish our educational goals. I am confident that everyone in the Greater Haddonfield community shares my profound gratitude for our extraordinary administration, board, faculty, families, students and staff. 

intervention, ask yourself the following questions: Are regular coping strategies insufficient to help with anxiety? Is anxiety getting in the way at home, school, or with friends? Is anxiety causing the child and/or family a lot of distress?

If the answer to one or more of these questions is yes, your family may benefit from the input of a mental health professional. When seeking mental health services for an anxious child, keep in mind that Cognitive Behavioral Therapy or CBT is considered by many to be the gold-standard, first-step of intervention.

When looking for a therapist some helpful questions to ask are:

Have you treated children with X problem? For how long do you usually see clients? Do you use evidence-based treatments?

Did your training include supervised experience?

At the end of the day, trust your instinct in choosing the mental health services that are best for your family.


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
